Influence of French & Indian War on colonists

- Colonists profited from long struggle
 - Colonial militias
 - Cooperation between colonies

- British gov't needed money
 - Adopted new policy & laws
 - Result = trouble

- Florida and Canada

 - Jeffrey Amherst
 - "Cherokee Rebellion"
 - Policy = created resentment

- Religious awakening
 - Neolin

- Pontiac's Conspiracy
 - Tribes attacked forts

 - Brit send Small Pox

 - Colonel Henry Bouquet

 - 1763-64 war rages

 - Amherst replaced by Gen. Thomas Gage

 - Williams tried diplomacy

 - Pontiac accepts generous peace terms

 - Led to tension between gov't & colonists

 - Indirect taxes vs. direct taxes
 - Stamp Act = direct
- Increased Tensions 1765 - 1774
 - “Virtual representation”
 - Opposition to Stamp Act

- Repeal & continued unrest
 - Lord North
 - Repealed Townshend Acts
 - Quartering Act expired
 - Left duty on tea
 - Gaspee Incident
 - Brit response
 - Gov. Hutchinson
 - Committees of Correspondence
 - Samuel Adams & James Otis
 - Other “founders” involved
 - The Tea Act (1773)
 - British East India Company
 - 17 million pounds of unsold tea
 - Lord North had to save
