Japan

- Shaped by geographic conditions
- Ethnically = mixed origins
 - Language = Altaric family
- 200s BC = "bronze" age
 - Period = Yayoi
 - Starts in Kyushu
 - Numerous small warring states
 - Rulers = hereditary chieftains
 - NOTE: the Ainu
 - Yayoi contacts w/ mainland
 - Population boom (1st cen AD)
 - Expansion
 - Transportation
 - Close ties w/ Korea
 - NOTE: Weizhi
 - Local conflicts arise
 - Winners = +land, +\$\$\$, +power
 - Clans divided by class
 - Military aristocracy develops
- Kofun Period begins 3rd cen

- Migrants from Paekche
- Yamato emerge
 - Result = unique civilization forms
 - Yamato chieftains = Sumeramikoto
 - Develop Chinese-style state
 - Claim title = Tenno
 - Link clan to Jimmu
 - Yamato imperialism
- Society = matriarchal
 - Ex. Empress Jingū
 - Majority of Shinto deities = female
- Shintoism develops
 - Focus = natural forces & ancestors
 - Inspires art & poetry
 - Shamans
 - Yamato linked with Amaterasu Omikami
 - ─ NOTE: 2nd important aspect
 - All clans linked with kami
 - Yamato "check" Buddhism
- Nara Period begins 7th cen
 - Seeds sewn during reign of Empress Suiko

- Was "empress-regnant"
- Her rule = start of unique system
- Nara = period of Chinese influence
 - 1st steps by Shotoku Taishi
 - Opens embassy in T'ang court
 - Drafts Kenpo Jushichijo
 - » Based on Confucianism
 - **>>** Basis = "Will of Heaven"
 - Emperor Kotoku embraces Shotoku's reforms
 - Issues Taika Reform Edicts
 - Written by T'ang Confucian scholars
 - > It = Japanese Imperial System
 - » NOTE: Flaws
 - Built capital Nara
 - » Based on Ch'angan
 - » Capital until 794AD
- Heian Period
 - Triggered by Emperor Kammu
 - Founds Heian-kyo
 - Heian Period = 3 ½ cen of peace
 - Rules = Confucian & divine

- Gov't = Chinese imperial pattern
 - Council of State
 - Eight ministries
 - NOTE: difference w/ China
 - Most important = Imperial Household Ministry
 - Local gov't = ~60 provinces
- Reforms end = weakening of rulers
 - Apparatus = too much
- 2 offices control gov't
 - 1) Bureau of Archivists
 - 2) Police Commissioners
- Fujiwara take control
 - Fujiwara = hereditary regents
 - Most influential = Fujiwara no Michinaga
 - Fujiwara use "web" to control
 - Monarchs "retire" when heir old enough
 - Fujiwara regents "manage"
- Consequence = power shifts to provinces
 - Rise of *Daimyo*
 - Resentments of Fujiwara
- Emperor Go-Shirakawa

- *Hōgen* Rebellion erupts
- Fujiwara removed
- Establishes gov't offices
- Confiscated Fujiwara lands
- Develops ties w/ daimyo
- Consequence = New military system
 - Daimyo had private armies
 - NOTE: tried Chinese military system
 - Emperor Kammu abandons
 - Recruits local warriors
 - "Samurau" = samurai
 - Official recruits replaced by private bands
 - Reason = \$\$\$\$
 - Most samurai from well-to-do families
 - Role = preserve order; tax collection
 - 1st disputes = End of 9th cen
 - District officials vs. provincial governors
 - 10th cen: regional coalitions form = conflict
 - Ex. Jōhei Tengyo no ran
 - Cycle repeats over & over
 - Result = court manipulates daimyo

- Code of Bushido
 - Seven primary virtues
 - NOTE: seppuku
 - Goal = "good death" not "future rewards"
- Japanese Buddhism
 - Mahayana Buddhism
 - Monasteries involved with state
 - Adopts magic & mystery of Shinto
 - Two new Buddhist sects: Tendai & Shingon
 - Saichō Tendai
 - >> Center = Mount Hiei
 - Kūkai Shingon
 - >> Shingon focus = eternal & cosmic Buddha
 - **»** Remains popular
 - Buddhism assimilated in Shinto
 - At village level
 - In capital
 - Not disentangled until 19th cen
- Japans Feudal Age
 - Emperors lose control
 - Minamoto clan emerges

- Leader = Minamoto Yoritomo
- Go-Shirakawa grants title *Sei-iTaishōgun*
- Yoritomo's capital at Kamakura
 - Bakufu
 - Few offices
- Later *shōgun*s follow precedent
- Kamakura shōgunate = "super-feudal" order
 - Built on Fujiwara system
- Feudalism = hierarchy
 - Emperor "owns" kingdom
 - Shōgun runs state
 - Daimyo runs provinces
 - Samurai run villages
 - Lord & Vassal
 - Involves "homage"
- Minamoto power = brief
 - Masako & Hōjō usurp power
 - NOTE: women in Kamakura period
 - Masako = shikken for sons
 - Hōjō make *shikken* hereditary

- NOTE: Jōkyū Incident
 - Go-Toba resists
 - Daimyo support Hōjō
- New system = vassals loyal to bakufu
- Hōjō maintain control thru 1333
 - Ashikaga Takauji triggers Sengoku Jidai
